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In my role as President of **Best Doctors Canada Inc.**, major medical events are a daily occurrence. Thousands of cases over the years have taught me valuable life lessons. Here's one case I'd like to share. It taught me the importance of never giving up. And more importantly, it taught me that when it comes to my family's health, one of the best things I can do is my homework. Knowing where to turn if we need it can make the vital difference to outcomes.

Three years ago, *Dan and *Ruth were filled with the euphoric high of being first-time, expectant parents. Then baby *Alexis was born. Blissful euphoria turned to terror. Alexis was born with a rare heart defect. Though surrounded by caring, highly qualified specialists, Dan and Ruth were told nothing further could be done for their son. Rather than preparing for a homecoming, the new parents had to prepare for his imminent death. Parenting was compressed from nursery to palliative care in the space of a few days.
